Nationwide Survey Shows That Duplicating Levies Cut Purchasing Power

AMOUNT LEFT TO BUY GASOLINE 70.6¢

of consumer buying-power, already is being felt in New York through taxes which prevent purchasers from getting full value for their gasoline dollar, according to the New York Petroleum Industries The Committee has reported to its members that a nationwide sur-

vey of retail gasoline prices and taxes, made by the American Association of State Highway Officials, shows that a substantial proportion of every dollar spent for gasoline at service stations goes for duplicating federal and state taxes. The effect, the Committee said, is to deflate the gasoline dollar by reducing its purchasing power. "You will be as surprised as your

rustomers to learn that dollar deflation through taxation largely has offset the benefits your customers would have derived from gasoline price economies achieved by you and your industry," the Committee's report said. "Your customers now pay one of the heaviest retail sales taxes imposed upon any generallyused commodity, and the purchasing power of their gasoline dollar
