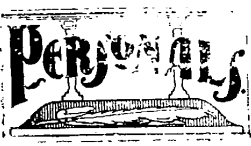

Governor Signs Nurse License Measure

Albany, April 7.—State of persons desiring to practice in New York is required July 1, 1938, under a new Governor Lehman's today.

The law stipulates license one of two classes, either a "practical professional nurse" or "practical nurse." Only those will be permitted use of the "R.N."

Any person holding such certificate, however, must without a fee or further examination of the two new license application to the State Education Department prior to that date.

Practice of nursing by a person will be a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than \$25 for a first offense and \$50 for a second offense.

Graduate nurses and nurses who wish to apply for licenses should write direct to Stella Hawkins, R.N., secretary of the Board of Nurse Examination Bldg., Albany, N. Y. to license fees until requested by Miss Hawkins.
