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## Editorial

### SINGLE SCHOOL SESSION

Why can we not have a single school session in Andover High School? This idea has been suggested several times, but has never been carried out.

This system would have every possible advantage over our present school system during the warm spring months. Under this plan, school would open at 20 minutes after eight, and close at one o'clock. Forty minute periods would constitute the schedule. Extra curricular activities would be more ably carried out in the afternoon. Students would be better able to study on cool summer mornings than they would during hot June afternoons before Regents, when study is most needed.

Farmers, whose children are needed at home to work would appreciate the fact that the students would be home the greater part of the afternoon. There would also be less motive for skipping school.

There are no factories in this vicinity which have working hours that would prevent such a program.

On the whole, this program is most practical because it gives the students a better chance to study. The teacher and parents would benefit. Extra curricular activities would be carried on with greater enthusiasm. There is absolutely no good reason why a single school session would not be met with approval by the students.

## Here and There In A. H. S.

### Principal Receives First Lesson in Cooking

On Wednesday morning during the daily chemistry class, the students told Mr. Bretsch, principal, the laboratory preparation of gelatin.

The first time the pupils let him make it his own way. First he heated about one-third of a cup of water and when it boiled he poured in a whole package of gelatin that ordinarily makes a pint of gelatin. Result? A thick, sticky, porous ball on top of the water.

As he knew this was the wrong result, he started again. One of the girls told him that the water should be poured on the gelatin. He then put another package of gelatin in another container and started to pour the hot water on that, when one girl told him that he wouldn't need all the gelatin for such a small amount of water. He poured most of the gelatin out and then poured the water on the remainder and stirred it.

In the chemistry class the next day the girls told him that he should have soaked the gelatin five minutes in a little cold water before pouring on the hot water. The gelatin was very good for its purpose—to illustrate colloids.

## News of 4-H Clubs

Information is being sought from 4-H Clubs of the State this summer thru the National 4-H Rural Electrification program which is designed to advance the use of electricity on farms along the most efficient and economical lines. Approval and supervision of the project by the State Extension Service makes all club boys and girls eligible for participation.

Gains last year in farm electrification were high. Through the nation were roundly 290,000, which brings the total to 1,941,595, according to best figures. It is estimated that 250,000 additional farms are served by other sources.

Clubsters are asked to report on the use of electricity in their poultry, canning, and other projects, or how it might be used; to give practical and economical reasons for the use of various electrical appliances; describe any activity like discussions or demonstrations on the farm use of electricity; submit a record of general 4-H activities; and describe electrical projects or activities on wiring and installation and care of appliances.

Awards are provided viz: gold medal for the best county report, all expense trip to National 4-H Club Congress for best state report, and college scholarships of \$100, \$200, and \$100 for the highest rating winners by Extension divisions, the donor being the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company. No fee or obligation of any kind is required of contestants.

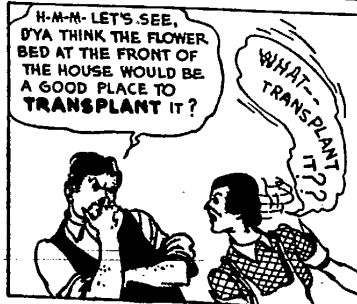
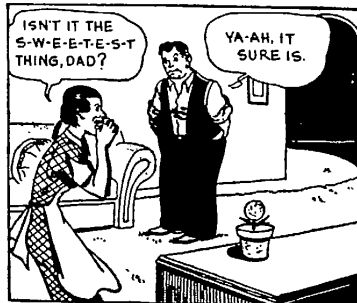
