The object of their visit was to study wildlife, principal lay bird life, in the North. As the season was not suited for birds during the winter, Mr. Watson is remaining the remaining there and will return home in June.

Mrs. Watson tells us that the villager of Harrington Harbor is an English settlement; no Eskimos nearer than 250 miles northward and no polar bears! It is a small town, having two small churches, a small schoolhouse, a hospital and a post-office.
