Farm Bureau Has Loan Applications

Farmers interested in receiving loans through the Farm Security Administration are advised that loan applications may be made out at the Farm Bureau office at Belmont. Those eligible to receive such loans are those who would be unable to participate in the 1938 Agricultural Conservation program because of inability to finance the purchase of materials necessary to carry out soil building practices—that is; farmers who do not have funds of their own to finance purchases and for whom private financing is not available. The amount of this type of loans is limited to 85 per cent of the estimated payment for the farm under the 1938 program.

The 1938 program, also carries provisions for assignment of checks where an assignment is necessary to enable a farmer to purchase his supplies. Banks, and dealers in lime, seed and fertilizer have been notified of the procedure necessary to execute an assignment. Assignments may be filled out at the Farm Bureau office, at Belmont.

Applicants for 1938 crop loans, (another type of loan) that have not filed applications should apply at the Farm Bureau office on May 3. A representative of the Farm Credit Administration will be in Belmont that day to assist in preparing loan applications. No other definite appointment will be made for this purpose this spring.
