## Plant Potatoes Now For Best Results Says H. J. Evans

Seed Potato Association Official Urges New York State Farmers to Plant Early for Quality Crop.

With a view to greater consumption of New York State potatoes, the Department of Agriculture and Markets advances a suggestion for improvement made by H. J. Evans of Georgetown, representing the New York Co-operative Seed Potato Association, Inc.

Mr. Evans says the potato grower himself is at fault if any complaint is lodged against any of the potatoes grown in New York State. Growers who want a crop of the highest quality will plant immediately, he explains.

The time to plant potatoes is between April 15 and May 15, the representative of the seed potato association points out in a communication to the department as follows: "As a general rule, New York State potatoes are of excellent quality. Some farmers have been planting their seed potatoes as late as the Fourth of July but those who follow that practice cannot expect a crop of the best quality.

"The time to plant potatoes is between April 15 and May 15. We can't plant potatoes on the Fourth of July and expect them to mature before frost. Good quality potatoes must be planted early enough to mature in September. Potatoes planted too late sometimes turn black in cooking. That can be avoided by planting now."

The Department of Agriculture & Markets, under Commissioner H. V. Noyes is interested in the promotion of potatoes as well as other food products of the State. This promotional work is carried on largely thru Consumers' Information Service of the Department, which holds to the axiom that better crops mean better consumer satisfaction.

## 4-H Club Girls' Week-end Camp

Mrs. Emma Dolson Nevin, State 4-H Club specialist from Cornell University, will meet with Allegany County 4-H Club girls at Eggleston Park for an overnight camp on May 6th and 7th.

Girls are cordially invited to attend this camp and receive help and instruction in clothing projects. Inasmuch as many of the girls are making uniforms, it would be desirable for them to bring their uniforms to camp in order that Mrs. Nevin can give them some help and criticism. This will be a good preparation for the girls in preparing for the clothing review to be held at the annual 4-H Club Rally Day in Wellsville on Friday, May 13th.

No charge will be made for the camp, the only expense being for food supplies which the girls will be asked to bring with them.

## Maintain Bureaus For Proposed Amendments

Plans are now under way to establish two bureaus in Allegany county where copies of all proposed amendments introduced in the present Constitutional Convention will be kept on file for the benefit of all who wish to refer to them.

One of the bureaus will be established with Denzil G. Perkins, clerk of the Board of Supervisors in Belmont and the other at Mr. Fisher's office in Angelica.
