The festival opened at 3 o'clock with the presentation of a skit "Yes, Dear," followed by another, "The Advice Doctor," put on by Friendship Central School. Salamanca High School presented the play "Two Crooks and a Lady." This was followed by a discussion which included techniques of lighting scenes in plays and of starting rehearsals for productions. Expert light technologists demonstrated the use of recent innovations in stage lights, particularly the glazed glass plate on baby spots.

Following the profitable discussion, a very delicious dinner was served at Social Hall. At 7 o'clock the Footlight Club of the university put on a demonstration. Following this the Alfred Collegiate Center of Jamestown presented "The Marriage Proposal."

In view of "Be Kind to Animals Week," seventh grade pupils have just completed pet posters.

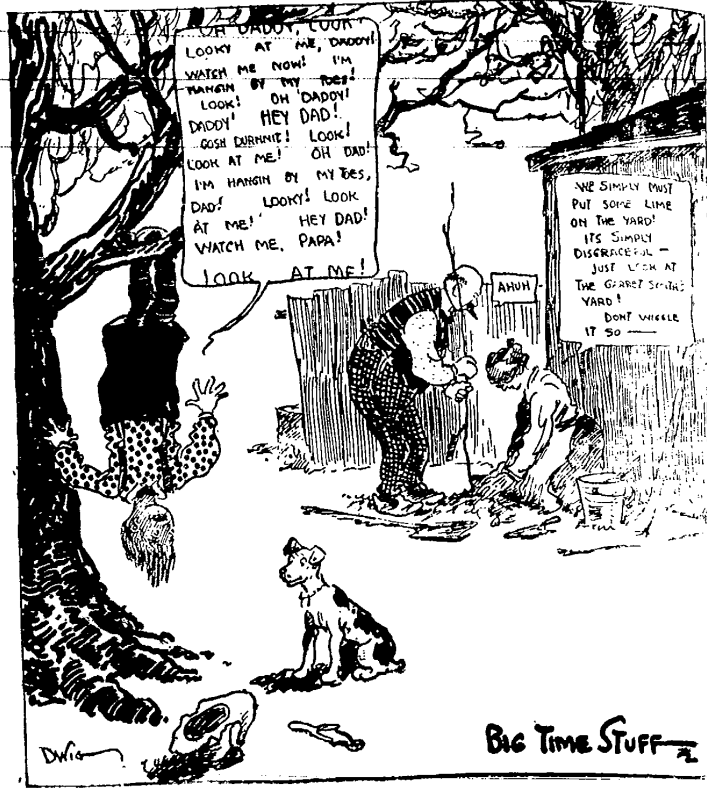
Fred Ellis of the eighth grade has left school.
