Andover Library is Twenty-five Years Old

Brief History of the Organization Telling Origin and Continuing Growth of This Institution

Twenty-five years seem a long period of time as we look back in retrospect how rapidly years have passed. This month, to be exact, 1928, marks the 25th anniversary of the formal opening of the Andover Free Library.

To the Lucy Stone Clubman's Suffrage organization, which had been holding a membership of the credit must be given the original thought of a public library for our village. The Club, a literary club, in gave their support to the under the leadership of the presidents of these societies, M. Burrows of the Lucy Stone Club and Mrs. J. M. Brundage of Chautauque Circle, the undertaking which required a sum of \$100 approved by the town.

This was accomplished through the subscription through the Andover lady, who gave and carriage travel expenses at rural home, instances were received, however, that those who were most generous in their support, which in those days were highly in the town. The very generous gift of Mrs. Brundage of the site of our library now stands as the procuring of the building in 1912, which was opened May 20, 1913.

December 21, 1899 complete organization of Free Library in Andover charter granted from the board of trustees named.

In 1911 the town of Andover appropriated and in 1932 the village appropriation of the following ladies as librarians: Mrs. A. Mrs. J. M. Brundage, M. Hinchey, Mrs. Arling Mary Snyder and Mrs. I. The first two ladies terms gratuitously.
