About 45,000,000 people in the U. S. are without libraries. Today the books in the libraries of our country are working overtime. The demand for them has doubled in the last ten years and in numerous libraries they are being worn out faster than they can be replaced. A few years back libraries were advertising books in order to lure rather an indifferent public taste; now they can hardly satisfy the hunger for good books.

Books have become a necessity in an unstable world, yet there are 45 million people who have no public libraries within reach; 45 million live in small villages or in the open country, and having few books of their own, they are deprived of the basic means of education.

Fortunately the states are helping to overcome this situation by agencies which help establish libraries. They also advise and strengthen those that need it, send books directly to people who have no libraries. Care at hand and aid paid to establish libraries is one of the best ways to a brighter future.

Andover to Play Canaseraga Friday

Friday afternoon the Andover football team will play Canaseraga in Canaseraga. Canaseraga is the second team to play Andover this season in the Canaseraga-Andover football series. This is a three way tie for first place between Andover, Canaseraga and Belmont as each has won two and lost one. At the beginning of the season Andover defeated Canaseraga at Andover by the score of 7 to 4, behind the pitching of Burgett and Greene.

Andover Places Second in Meet

Scoring 25 points in running and field events, the Andover track team was outscored only by Wellsville. All the running was done on a muddy track most of the time. The following Andover contestants placed in the events:

The relay team (Dolan, Oakes, Joyce and Greene) placed second. The fact that Wellsville does not compete in the county meet and that in a majority of the events Andover was beaten only by Wellsville men, makes the outlook for Andover winning the county meet in June very good.

Belfast scored 17 points and Friendship 7. The latter had but three entries in the meet. The broad jump, high jump, pole vault, 220 yd. run, discus and javelin were not completed because of rain.

Homemaking Specialist Attraction At Exhibit

The Homemaking Department, which is new to Andover this year, attracted a great deal of attention at the annual exhibit May 17th. Dresses, housecoats, skirts, smocks blouses, sweaters and other articles of clothing made by the homemaking girls were displayed.

Correct table setting for a luncheon was illustrated by showing a table properly arranged. The linen was made by members of the Home Arts 8 Class. Other settings were shown in pictures arranged on a bulletin board.

An exhibit arranged by one of the classes studying foods, portrayed graphically the amount of minerals present in common foods. Everybody needs a certain amount of calcium, phosphorus, and iron daily. A cup of milk provides almost half the calcium, a fifth of the phosphorus and only a twentieth of the iron for good health. The exhibit showed the amount of other foods necessary to supply as much of these minerals as are provided in a cup of milk. Two loaves of white bread or one of whole wheat provide as much calcium; four slices of white bread or half a slice of whole wheat provide as much iron and three slices of whole wheat or five of wheat bread as much phosphorus. Other foods and their amounts which contain calcium are a half dozen oranges, three-eighths cup of molasses or eleven eggs. Phos-
