The purple and white track squad will enter the county meet this Thursday, May 26. This meet will take place on the Houghton field at Hamilton every school in the county except Wellsville competing.

Our Homemakers FOOD FOR THE FAMILY

Every person in a family group needs meals providing calories, protein, minerals and vitamins. In nearly every family there are people in the following groups: high school boys and girls, young school children, pre-school children and adults.

The high school boy or girl eats heavier food because he or she is more active and is growing faster than in any other period of his or her life. This group needs at least a quart of milk a day or foods that need milk in their preparation such as cereals and cereal products. In addition fruits, vegetables, eggs, meats, fats and sugar are necessary for good health. The diet of boys and girls in this period of life should not include coffee and tea because it crowds out milk, is apt to stop the normal growth and may lead to a life habit.

The young school children require the same needs except that they shouldn't have so many sweets and so much meat.

The pre-school child should have milk, cereals, fruits, vegetables, eggs, meat and sugar and fats occasionally in small amounts.

In the diet of the infant there is milk, strained fruits and vegetables in small amounts and fruit juices. Milk, vegetables, fruits, cereals, eggs, meat and other protein high foods, butter and butter substitutes in moderation form the basis of the adult's diet.

The diet alone cannot furnish good health. Regular meal time is a necessary item. The Home Economics class is studying personality and health habits with other people.

The chaperones were Mr. and Mrs. Louis Joyce and Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Alvord.

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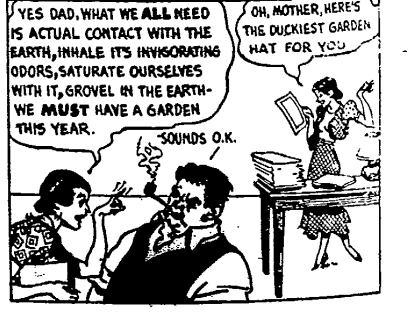
