#### It's Time to Fight Tent Caterpillar

"If you have not already omething about the tent caterpillar, you better start now while the in-sects are still small and before they begin wandering all over the garden or orchard," said Professor A. H. MacAndrews of the New York State College of Forestry at Syracuse Uni-

versity.

"On stormy and cold days the whole colony of caterpillars can be found within the cell. Hand pick this and destroy it at once, but be sure the caterpillars are at home in the web and not out feeding on the foliage, otherwise the destruction of the web is a waste of time," warns

Professor MacAndrews.

He says: "Burning the webs on the trees is often resorted to but it is not recommended for general use, as the average person does more permanent harm to the bark with the fire than the insects do. Be-sides, many of the insects drop to the ground at the approach of heat
