DISH FOR THIS WEEK

A delicious way to make strawberries "go further," is to serve them with simple rice, cornstarch or tapioca puddings.

Strawberry Fluff

1 cup of sugar
1 quart of fresh strawberries, hulled
3 tablespoons of tapioca
1/4 teaspoon of salt
1 egg white, stiffly beaten.
Add 1/2 cup of sugar to 1/2 quart of strawberries. Let them stand for 15 minutes and then crush the berries. Measure the juice and pulp into the upper part of a double boiler together with enough water to make 2 1/2 cups of liquid; then add the tapioca and salt. Cook the mixture for 15 minutes, or until the tapioca is clear, stirring it frequently; then cool it.
Cut the remainder of the berries in halves (save enough choice ones for garnishing) and sprinkle them with the remaining 1/2 cup of sugar. When the tapioca mixture is cool, fold in the egg white and the halved berries. Garnish this with the whipped cream and whole berries. This recipe will serve six persons.
For a meatless spring dinner, the New York State College of Home Economics suggests: an onion-flavored omelet, fresh asparagus, creamed potatoes garnished with carrots, a bowl of green salad, graham bread and butter, strawberry fluff for dessert, and milk, at least for the youngsters, and coffee for grown-ups.

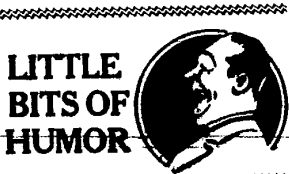

Social Security Board Allots \$608,331.55 to New York

The Social Security Board has authorized allotments totalling \$608,331.55 to New York State for unemployment insurance administration, it was announced today by Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg, Regional director of the Board for New York State. The money is for the period from April 1 to June 30.
The total consists of three separate allotments, Mrs. Rosenberg explained, \$279,174.42 being a supplemental grant for unemployment insurance administration, and the remainder including additional grants of \$158,816.46 for unemployment insurance and \$170,340.67 for employment services. These two amounts were allotted as part of the approved budget for the services, she said, and bring to 70 per cent the amount the state has received on the budgets. The balance of 30 per cent, according to word received by Mrs. Rosenberg from Washington, will be certified for payment immediately after the deficiency bill now pending is made effective.
