A delicious way to make straw-berries "go further," is to serve them with simple rice, cornatarch or tapi

Strawborry Fluff

1 cup of sugar quart of fresh strawborrie

3 tablespoons of tapinca 1/4 teaspoon of salt 1 egg white, stiffly beaten.

Add % cup of sugar to ½ quart of strawberries. Let them stand for 15 minutes and then crush the bersies. Moreover, the bridge of the bersies. When the tapioca mixture is cool, fold in the egg white and the halved berries. Garnish this with the whipped cream and whole berries. This recipe will serve six persons.
