The annual meeting of the Allegany County Rural Mail Carriers Association met at Ward Hall, Belmont, Wednesday of this week.

 The Hugnet Silk Co. of Hornell, largest of its kind in this section, closed down Monday for an indefinite period. The closing of this plant will result in the loss of 250 employees.

 Daily average production of crude oil in the United States dropped 185,550 barrels during the week ended May 21, the largest decline registered since the week ended December 31, 1932. This curtailment of output reflected strenuous efforts by the industry to forestall a general price cut for midcontinent crude with possible further repercussions on quotations for refined products.

**Notice of Hearing On Fireworks**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a hearing will be held in the Village Office, corner of Main and Center street, Andover, New York, on Monday, June 20 at 7:30 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of amending an ordinance passed June 19, 1930 regulating the display and sale of fireworks in said village.  
 The purpose of the proposed amendment is to limit the display and sale of fireworks as well as the firing or discharging of same to the Fourth of July and the day preceding and to prohibit the sale and discharging of fireworks on Sunday.  
 The amendment to be voted on at said hearing is as follows:  
 "No person, firm or corporation, shall at any time hereafter display, expose for sale, or sell any species of fire arms, rockets, squib, gun powder or any fireworks, or thing whatsoever charged with gun pow-  
 der or other explosive matter to any other person, persons or corporation or at retail to the public in general, for the purpose of firing, discharging, exploding or using the same for celebration purposes or the making of unnecessary noise or noises there-with within the limits of the Village of Andover, N. Y.  
 This section shall not apply to the selling or displaying for sale of fireworks by retail dealers or to the firing, discharging or exploding of same by any person on the Fourth of July and the day preceding except that when such holiday or preceding day falls on Sunday, the selling and discharging of fireworks shall be permitted only on the preceding Saturday and the following Monday.  
 Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to the penalty of a fine of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each and every violation and in addition to such penalty, violation thereof shall constitute disorderly conduct and such persons shall be a disorderly person, and may be arrested without a warrant by any police officer or constable of said village.  
 This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication and posting according to law."
