Potatoes baked with tomatoes add delicious variety to the potato bill-of-fare, suggests the New York State College of Home Economics.

## N. Y. State Baked Potatoes And Tomatoes

4 cups of raw diced potatoes  
¼ cup of tomato pulp  
¼ cup of water  
¼ cup of oil or butter  
1 teaspoon of paprika or pepper  
1 small onion Parsley.

Wash, pare and dice the carrots. Mix them with the other ingredients and pour into a baking dish; cover the dish and bake in a slow oven for about 40 minutes.

For a simple dinner the college suggests:

Baked potatoes and tomatoes, broiled liver and bacon, green string beans, carrot and raisin salad, bread and butter, chocolate pudding, milk at least for the youngsters, and coffee for the adults, if desired.



**Answers:**

1. The Romans followed the strange custom of driving nails into cottage walls because they considered the procedure a sure antidote against plague.
