Highlights of 1937-38 Sports

When the school year started, the outlook for a successful season in sports looked rather dim to Andover High School. All of the basketball team, most all of the track material and all of the baseball team had graduated at the close of the previous year. A new group of inexperienced yet eager athletes was left to take their place.

At the first of November basketball practice was started. Coach McGee was once more faced with the problem of making a good team from inexperienced material. Long hard practices were held almost every night after school. When the first game of the season was completed, the purple and white found themselves the victors by a lop-sided score of 52-11, Greenwood being the victim. The team was found to be much better than had been expected. All but two of the league games were won. Angelica was defeated twice by the purple and white. Wellsville was also upset twice. The championship was lost in a game with Alfred. Andover was leading with ten seconds left to play. A fumble on the part of the team however accounted for a score by Alfred. In the overtime, Alfred won the game.

The outlook for an even more successful season in basketball is good. All of the team, except two, plan to return to school for another year. The purples in improvement of some of the second team players will also make a fine team at the title match struggle.

The bigger surprise of the year was the winning of the Allegany County Track Meet by Andover. Track is considered a secondary sport for this school, baseball coming first. A week before the meet was held in Houghton, a number of boys were excused from baseball to practice for the track meet. An amount of fairly good runners were discovered. At the track meet, the purple and white took first in the 100 yard dash, the 220 yard dash and the 220 low hurdles. Second places were taken in the shot and 220 low hurdles and mile. By winning the meet may mean that track will become the principal spring sport. Four boys from Andover went to Rochester to run in the Rochester Sectional meet. They were Don Hardy, Don Oakes, Clyde Briggs and Orville Earley.

The spring baseball season found a few half experienced men on the team. Burgett, Dugan, Hardy and Briggs had played some on the team the year before. However, the team did not do so well. The weakest spot in the team was its batting. Perry, Briggs, Hardy and Dolan were the best batters. The team started out with three straight wins. However, Belmont sent the team on a downward grade after a 5-1 defeat. Only one game was won after the first defeat. The purple and white again placed second as it has so many times before in all sports.

Coach McGee has accomplished much this year in the line of sports considering the fact that little material is available. To him can be given credit for what the purple and white has accomplished the entire year.

Homemakers' Exchange of Helpful Household Hints and Recipes Conducted by ELEANOR HOWE

Apartment dwellers, as well as others, need no longer be perplexed over how to dispose of the dust in the vacuum cleaner bag. First, spread a newspaper on the floor; then take the dust bag from the cleaner and put the opening of the dust bag deep into a very deep paper bag. Place the palm of your hand over the metal opening at the top of the cleaner bag and hold the paper bag closely around the cloth bag. Then, gently shake the dust into the paper bag.

Other exciting things, besides beans, come from Boston, for here is a recipe for Glorious Spuds that originated in that historic city. Pars and slice the desired number of potatoes and arrange in layers in a buttered casserole, sprinkling each layer with salt, pepper and sour. Then pour over a can of cream of celery soup and bake in moderate oven (350°) until tender.

With Lent bringing about a big try on fish and seafoods, let's not forget the appropriateness of oysters. And, yet, it's simple too, to prepare them in this fashion: Sprinkle oysters with salt and pepper; dip them in beaten egg diluted with a small quantity of water, and roll in fine cracker meal. Then fry in butter over a medium flame for about 10 minutes, turning once. Cover the bottom of a hot platter with hot tomato sauce and place the oysters in it; garnish with chopped parsley and serve at once.

CARROT ICE CREAM? How peculiar! Yes, but it's a clever teasing way to incorporate carrots in the daily diet. Just try it: Soak 1 tablespoon gelatin in 1/4 cup cold milk; dissolve in 1 1/2 cups hot milk. Then add 1/2 cup sugar and 2 beaten egg yolks and cook
