Village Board Make Improvements This Summer

Will Improve Fire Maple Streets by Resurfacing. Work Situation Undeveloped

A number of improvements are under consideration by the village board, some already in progress, in the street resurfacing program.

The next improvement to be undertaken is the resurfacing of the village board, some already in progress, in the street resurfacing program.

The survey work has been completed by Engineer O. J. Boyd and necessary changes to the plan.

The street is to be resurfaced with a top similar to that put in recently. It is the intent of the board to use local labor as far as possible in the construction of the work.

In regard to improving water supply, nothing has been worked out as yet. The board expects to form a committee in the future that will study the water supply and the board is now waiting for a PWA grant to start the construction of a water supply.
