Across the Principal's Desk

Each year it has been brought to my attention that on Commencement night the seating problem has presented many difficulties, particularly in regard to parents of members of the graduating class.

Certainly we will agree that the parents should receive first consideration in any seating arrangement, and so, after consulting with the class, the following plan has been developed and we solicit the cooperation of everyone in making it as successful as possible.

There will be two reserved sections: Section I for the fathers and mothers of the graduates only, and Section II for the brothers and sisters and other relatives to whom the graduates wish to give the limited number of reserved section tickets that will be issued.

It should be kept in mind that the seating capacity of the auditorium is limited, and that the value of a reserved section is lost if the section is made too large. Seniors cannot give reserved section tickets to but a few of the people to whom graduation announcements were sent. We will provide as many unreserved seats as it is physically possible to do with safety.

Since parents of graduates will be seated in a separate section, it will not be possible for other relatives to be seated with them. Likewise, other relatives who have Section II tickets should not expect to have seated with them those who do not have reserved section tickets. In other words, if only those to whom the seniors can issue reserved section tickets are seated in the reserved sections, there will be no difficulties.

And in closing I would again thank and commend those who have helped make this school year successful—Board of Education, faculty, parents, pupils, and the many organizations and village people who are genuinely interested in the education and development of young people.

Clever Stunts Planned For Class Night

The Seniors have prepared a class night program which promises to be one of the most entertaining ever to be given here. Rehearsals began today since the majority of the class have completed their Regents examinations. The program is built around a court room scene wherein the members of the class are lawyers, witnesses and the guilty parties.

News of 4-H CLUBS

4-H Clubsters Should Get Particulars on Livestock Awards of Their Leaders

Around 1,000 4-H Clubsters will receive awards this autumn starting with county prizes in the ninth annual National 4-H Meat Animal Production Contest, conducted by the Extension Services of the various states. Particulars may be obtained of the local club leaders.

A watch fob with gold emblem of achievement will be awarded in every county of the United States to the Clubster whose record in livestock projects is designated as outstanding by the county agent.

Records of county champions in this state will be judged for state honors in the State Club Leaders' office previous to Nov. 1. The winner will compete with other state champions in his extension division for

a Chicago trip. Three of the highest rating trip winners will be awarded cash college scholarships of \$300, \$200 and \$100. No fee or obligation of any kind is required of contestants except that they be bona fide 4-H Club members carrying on livestock projects.

In nine years 240 boys have won gold watches as state prizes, 21 boys and one girl have received trips to the National 4-H Club Congress and International Livestock Exposition and \$4,800 in college scholarships have gone to national winners.

These awards are annually accepted by the State Extension Service from Thos. E. Wilson, as valued incentives to boys to master problems of successful production, marketing and exhibition and develop superior herds and flocks to help them thru college or start farming for themselves.

The short open season for the taking of beaver in this state rewarded 867 trappers with 2,639 of the highly-prized rodents, the Conservation Department announced recently. Hamilton county produced the highest take, 645.

Goldman and His Band to Honor Sousa's Name at N. Y. State Fair



A special tribute to the late John Phillip Sousa, the famous bandmaster, will be paid by Edwin Franko Goldman and his band when they appear at the New York State Fair in Syracuse, August 29 to September 10.

After the death of Sousa, Edwin Franko Goldman, conductor of Goldman's Band took his place as the world's leading bandmaster. Goldman is also internationally known as a composer. His whole career has been profoundly influenced by Sousa. One of Mr. Goldman's finest marches is entitled, "Tribute to Sousa," and he is also composer of "On The Mall" which ranks in popularity with the most famous marches ever written.

Paul Smith, Fair Director, announced that Goldman's Band will appear each afternoon on the bandstand during the religious services on Sunday. A tremendous turnout is expected for the religious services this year because the Fair will run two weeks instead of one week, as formerly.
