4th of July Eye Injuries Still Too High

Pointing out that the toll of eye injuries among the children and adults is still needlessly high, the State Commission for the Blind lists ten easy Fourth of July DON'T'S to help reduce blindness:

Don't try to investigate unexploded firecrackers (they may be just going off).

Don't be careless with blank cartridges (a powder blast may mean the loss of sight.)

Don't stand near a tin can with a lighted cracker under it (the can may shatter and hurl metal splinters into the eyes.)

Don't put a lighted firecracker in a bottle (glass splinters frequently strike the eyes.)

Don't hold sparklers near the eyes (they are not harmless.)

Don't hold Roman candles except parallel to the body (they may backfire.)

Don't throw lighted firecrackers near anybody (this may blind another person; it has happened.)

Don't stand near a bursting torpedo.

Don't get near a rocket (it sometimes shifts direction and may strike back.)

Don't spoil your fun by jeopardizing your own or another person's eyesight or life by being careless.
