ters into the eyes.)

Don't put a lighted firecracker in a bottle (glass splinters frequently strike the eyes.)

Don't hold sparklers near the eyes

(they are not harmless.) Don't hold Roman candles excent parallel to the body (they may backfire.)

Don't stand near a bursting tornedo. Don't get near a rocket (it some-times shifts direction and may strike back.)
