**Charles A. Mourhess**

We reprint the following from a Washington, D. C., newspaper:

Charles A. Mourhess, 49, of 4848 Brandywine Street, N. W., assistant chief of the Division of Control, Bureau of Public Roads, died Monday night in Sibley hospital, after a short illness.

Funeral services are being held this afternoon at Hysong's parlors, 1300 N. Street, N. W. Burial will be in Arlington National Cemetery.

A native of Andover, N. Y., Mr. Mourhess was educated at Alfred University and the Clarkson Institute of Technology, both in New York State. In 1910 he went to work for the Coast and Geodetic Survey. During the World War he served as a first lieutenant in the Army Engineer Corps, subsequently returning to work for the survey. About 15 years ago he began work for the Bureau of Public Roads.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Mourhess; a son, Charles W. Mourhess and daughter, Miss Mary Mourhess.

Mrs. Anna Duffy, 80, died June 25, 1938 at her home in Duffy Hollow. Mrs. Duffy was born in Ireland Jan. 12, 1858, daughter of Patrick and Mary Kailculen Dempsey and came to America 59 years ago.
