Writes Interesting From Congo, Africa Where She is Now Located.

We print another interest letter from Miss Eva Shepard in the Belgian Congo, Africa received recently by friend over. The letter follows:

Dear Friends:

At last, at last here I am. Instead of feeling veiled sort of feel as if I had a service. It was my first time. What a joy it was to see a black folk singing hymns.
