P. W. A. Grant \$171,000.00 for School Approval

Telegram Received P. W. A. Head Monday Approval For New Central

According to a telegram received Monday morning by the Board of Education from headquarters in Washington, D. C., a Federal grant of \$171,000.00 for a new central school in Andover has been approved by P. W. A.

This grant represents a gift of 45 per cent of the cost of new building construction and remodeling of old buildings. The proposed central rural school will cost in total amount of the grant to be spent, if the program is not required. In fact, the cost was purposely covered all possible contingencies in event the estimated cost of the program needed, the total amount of the grant would not be required. The remaining 55 per cent of the total amount of the grant will be for site, buildings and equipment. The grant is divided between the central district, the one-fourth of the balance of the central district three-fifths.

Before the grant is approved, a central district established, application has already been filed with the Board of Education. Department is not laying out school districts at this time. The new legislative school centralization as proposed by the Regents Inquiry Committee to Attorney Guy F. Corning, who has been the local Board of Education districts will be approved.
