Many Allegany county ladies are interested in the celebration of the 90th anniversary of the first Woman's Rights convention in the world held July 19-20, 1848 in Seneca Falls, N. Y., under supervision of Elizabeth Cady Stanton. Five years previous to this date, Mrs. Stanton and Lucretia Mott, whose names are remembered with deep respect by many members of the several Suffrage Clubs which at one time were well organized throughout Allegany county, of which the late Mrs. A. M. Burrows of Andover was for many years county president, organizer and president of the Andover Lucy Stone Club.

An appropriate marker has been placed by the State of New York near the building in Seneca Falls where the first convention was held, and a second one in front of the former home of Mrs. Stanton.
