### Application For Centralization Approved

Word Received From Albany This Week Approval of Centralization in Andover

The proposed establishment of a central rural school in Andover has been approved by the State Department, according to a letter received from Attorney General Chenev who attended the meeting of the Board of Regents last week and presented the application. Only applications from communities having Federal grants were considered.

It is understood that the central school will be put to a vote of the voters of the Andover district in the near future.

Mr. Chenev also reported that the proposed central school in Andover was approved by the State Department, which if the proposition carries over will be assured of a high school under the present reorganization that is recommended by the Federal committee headed by D. Young.

The formal survey of the district by the State Department, but it is expected that the centralization will be approved by the State Department.

There have also been some reports of a meeting for the purpose of organizing the central school, but no definite plans have been announced.
