Albany, N. Y., July 29

Albany, N. Y., July 29, 1938. The Motor Vehicle Bureau has announced that the number of motor vehicle accidents in Albany during the first six months of 1938 was 1,086, compared with 1,086 in the same period last year.

His comparative figures show a decrease in accidents, injuries despite a 27% increase in automobile registrations during the same period.

The record for June, 1938, marks the beginning of a decline in traffic density, which is a result of the recent increase in traffic density.

Commissioner Harnett said that the recent increase in accident statistics is a result of a campaign to lower the motor accident toll is still in progress. He said that for our records reveal that the rate for June is the lowest since 1928.

Traffic deaths for the first six months of 1938 were 1,086, compared with 1,086 in the same period last year. If the decline continues for the remainder of the year, the year's traffic toll would be the lowest since 1928.
