VOTE ON SCHOOL CENTRALIZATION AT SCHOOL MEETING TUESDAY, SEPT. 6

Next Tuesday, between 8 and 8 p. m., the school area will vote at school building to determine a central school district.

Over 100 years ago school districts were laid out in the State of New York and have little change since. It is necessary to revise the law to provide for a path through wooded land the only way to reach school.

Great progress has been made in nearly all endeavors, but one school still has not a great improvement, but the school when the boy enters the top round must have an equal opportunity to those who have the better schools or have a better school handicapped.

With the coming of more rapid means of transportation, the combining of schools is feasible and practical. It is possible to have larger, more modern buildings. This is an opportunity for the boys and girls to have a better school building and city and village.

Recognizing this fact, the department has an extensive study of the whole rural school system. This committee has its report and recommendations to the schools into larger units.

First: The report of 1,200 schools in the State maintained where the maintenance is less than the cost for each school is \$1,500 per year. State pays the larger part of running these schools. It is a perfect right to a school management.

Second: Recognizing that the rural school afforded equal opportunity to the village and city. It is to be in the interest of the State and the people of the State.

Therefore, the Education is committing a program which will bring changes both as regards schools and the communities. It is a department to centralize the schools with the larger ones. The plan to combine the school with the larger ones. As an end of this end, it is lending a hand to the village and city. It would seem to be a time, as such, is hard to see. Whether the time is here or not, it is going to be combined.

The principle upon which the people of the State are to be centralized at this time, it is a law that is being passed. The Legislature has already passed a law that has had 45 per cent of the new construction. It is a right gift; does not cost anything and perhaps will be able again. The dep
