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To the Voters on the Andover Centralized School Plan

We, the undersigned, residents and voters of the territory to be included in the proposed Centralized School District at Andover, desire to voice our approval of the proposed plan.

We also wish to express our appreciation to the Board of Education for the comprehensive booklet which it published, setting forth many pertinent facts concerning centralization and its application to this proposed district. The statements set forth in that booklet have been checked with competent authorities and we believe them to be correct.

In our opinion, Andover and surrounding territory has been offered an opportunity to secure a modern school which it can ill afford not to accept. An opportunity which undoubtedly will not again be available.

At the present time, the Government has offered to pay 45% of the cost of any necessary new construction. The State will pay 25% of the balance and the State aid available to the district will be increased annually from about \$40,000.00 to approximately \$79,000.00. It is quite certain that no such favorable terms will again be available.

If this generous offer is not accepted at this time, it undoubtedly means that in the near future:

That the outside districts will be included with more progressive schools which do not centralize and lost to Andover forever which would be a distinct loss not only to our school but to everyone in the village.

If these outside districts are lost to Andover, it is quite probable that we will lose our high school and be obliged to transport our high school students to some other high school. This conclusion is arrived at from the fact that it is quite certain that in the near future high schools which do not have a certain number of students will be deprived of State aid and it would be impossible to continue our high school without State aid. Without the students from the outside districts, there would not be a sufficient number to meet the necessary requirements for a high school.

There will be a loss of approximately \$39,000.00 per year in public money which will accrue to the benefit of adjoining centralized schools.

There will be a distinct loss in the value of every piece of real estate in the Village as no one would care to purchase property in a Village which does not have high school facilities.

It is quite certain that the part of the building constructed 35 years ago will soon be condemned by the State, and District No. 1 will be confronted with the cost of a new building without any Government aid and the cost of such a building would far exceed its share of any new construction required under centralization.

We are also of the opinion that with the exception of the first few years (possibly three years) the tax rate will be less under centralization than under the present plan and that over a period of ten years, the net cost to the taxpayers of the centralized district will be considerably less. The reason that the tax rate may be a little more for the first few years is because the State aid will be increased gradually from the present \$40,000.00 per year to the maximum of \$79,000.00 per year.

Therefore, we urge all voters and taxpayers to give earnest, intelligent thought, study and consideration to the plan, and, when the time comes, vote for what you consider to be for the best interest of the school, the community and yourselves.
