# BRIGHAM FOR SHERIFF COMMITTEE TAKES ISSUE

It is impractical from the standpoint of expenditure to conduct a political advertising campaign for the office of Sheriff. The salary in 1935 was reduced from \$2,200.00 to \$1,900.00 per year.

It is essential, however, to analyze some of the opposition's figures. The reduction in salary alone accounts for \$1,000 of Jones' savings. The comparative figures for the expense of Sheriff's Duties indicate that less work was assigned and less work was done by deputies under Jones than under Brigham. For example, Jones has done nothing about enforcing traffic laws, although a resolution was passed by the Board of Supervisors requesting this work.

The major cost of the improvements, outside of prison labor, on jail property was charged to the County Building's and Ground's expense, not the Sheriff's Department.

It is advertised by Jones that he was "faced with two expensive murder trials." One was the Scio-Scott case where Scott waited on the scene to be arrested. The other was the Friendship-Norton case where Norton walked into the State Police Precinct and surrendered. The deputies' time in Court was charged to Court Expense, not to the Sheriff's Department. What credit is due Jones here? Brigham had the Ahern and other important felony cases to investigate.

Give credit where credit is due, namely to the Board of Supervisors and its Sheriff Committee. They control the expenditures, regulate salaries, audit and approve the bills.
