Andover firemen's share of \$11,921 appreciation fund for the fire department, distributed to the residents, business and a \$5,000 check from the clear Refinery was \$783.34.

The checks were mailed Friday of this week to 34 firemen, two auxiliaries and their families. The fund was directed the moving of a truck was blown across the Genesee killing three persons, during the fire at the Clear Refinery on July 17-19.

The fund which was started immediately following the fire, had reached a grand total of \$11,921.20 some days ago. The fund will be distributed to the firemen and their families.

The finance committee, headed by President John A. Dolan, Chamber of Commerce, is now conducting the distribution of the fund. The formula for the distribution of the fund is based on the number of hours of service rendered by the firemen and their families. In addition to the fund, the fire companies will receive approximately \$100,000 from the insurance companies. The balance of the fund will be used to purchase approximately 100 shares of stock in the fire companies. The classification of the fire departments and the amount which each will receive is as follows:

Classification One
These companies have trucks and (or) rendered service. In two cases it was not furnished and in the Wellsville Department, a contribution was made between companies.

With the exception of the Wellsville Department, each of the companies sent trucks to the fire.

Classification Two
These companies have trucks or sent men and credited with a limited service in one form or another. This case \$100 was credited to each truck and a minimum of service rendered:

Friendship, Olean and each sending one truck, \$150 while Ebenezer and each will receive \$50. Class 1, \$500.

Classification Three
These companies that offered their assistance, but were not called upon for service. No amount of service was performed.

Classification Four
These companies that offered their assistance, but were not called upon for service. No amount of service was performed.
