

She then It has come to the attention of the Board that some people have the impression that a defeat of the bond issue would defeat centraliza-

it would, however, mean the loss of the Federal grant of \$171,000.00 which must be accepted by October 1st, and the district would still be obliged to do the same amount of building and bear the whole burden by taxation. Likewise if the district refused to authorize the bond issue and did not provide adequate school buildings, the State would also withhold the public money

The Board feels that it is its duty to present these facts to the taxpayers that they may be fully informed as to what a defeat of the hond issue would mean to them as taxpayers.

increase to approximately \$79,000.00 per year.

Immediately following its election, the Board of Trustees took up the matter of a building program. Mr. VanAuken of the Educational Department was here on Thursday to make a preliminary survey of the situation and advised us that it would not be permissable to place any additional buildings on the present site because of its inadequate size. There appears to be no place within the Village of sufficient area to meet the requirements of the Department except on lands adjoining the present Athletic Field. Trustees then secured options on various properties adjoining this field with the thought in mind that they would submit at least two different sites for the consideration of the voters. In order to hasten matters, a committee of the trustees went to Albany on Friday to confer with Dr. Wilson who is in charge of the buildings division.

The Committee was very cordially received and given every consideration by Dr. Wilson who informed us that the new part of the present building could be used with very little expense providing the new building was erected directly across the street in order that the whole could be operated as one unit, but that it would not be permissable to use the old building and areas the new building at any greater distance from the old

Therefore, the only available site and in our opinion a very acceptable one is directly across Elm Street from the present school which will include the so called Pease property and the H. E. Robinson property, including all of his lands lying to the south of the Athlet's Field, a total of 614 acres. These properties can be purchased for a total of \$10 500.00. After deducting the share of the cost to be pail from the Government grant and the salvage of the buildings, the cost to the district will not be much over \$5.000.00. This will give an entyrace and frontage on Elm Street of 237 feet and make the Athletic Field to the rear available to the school and thus save the expense of grading and fitting a separate field which in the cree of many schools has cost as much as our share of the entire site. This site meets with the approval of the Dopartment; appears a feasible solution as to the selection of a site and is recommended by this Board.

In view of this situation there appears to be but one plan to submit to the voters for their approval, which is to purchase the site across from the present buildings and erect thereon a building of sufficient size to cover our needs other than what can be accommodated in the present building.

The total cost to the taxpayers of the building program had been estimated at \$135,000.00. The Architect's estimate of the cost of building and site, approved by the Educational Department. within that estimate. The Board are of the opinion, however, that a certain amount should be included for contingenties which usually arise in any building program and have proposed a bond issue of which the district's share will be \$136,875.00

Referring to the notice of the meeting to be held September 28th, the bond issue is computed as follows:

> Total bond issue . To be paid by the State

Net cost to taxpayers ------

\$180,500.00

The interest on the bonds had been estimated at 31/2 % whereas at the present time they can undoubtedly be sold on less than a 3% basis. The bonds of the Cuba school recently sold on a 2.70% basis. This saving in interest will more than offset the small increase over estimated costs with the result that the annual charge to taxpayers will be less than had been estimated.

The Board is, therefore, pleased to report that it is able to arrange a building program as anticipated and presented to the voters prior to centralization; one approved by the Educational Department and within the estimated net cost as estimated by the Trustees of District No. 1. It also wishes to assure the people of the new centralized district that it will welcome suggestions at all times and will endeavor to the best of its ability to perform its duties in an impartial manner. It also trusts and believes that all those interested in establishing a school of which we may all feel proud will co-operate to the fullest extent. ROBERT COMMON.
