DISH FOR THIS WEEK

The perennial query, "What shall we have for dessert?" is easily answered in pear season. A delicious, easy and not-too-rich way to prepare pears is by baking them with a top of meringue.

Meringued Pears
6 large pears
6 tablespoons granulated sugar.
Grated lemon rind.
Candied ginger.
3 egg whites
¼ cup of powdered sugar.

Pare and core the pears, and place them in a baking dish. Fill the center of each with one tablespoon of granulated sugar and a little grated lemon rind or candied ginger. Add three or four tablespoons of water and bake until the pears are tender. Then cover them with a meringue made of the stiffly-beaten egg whites and the powdered sugar, and brown this quickly.

To serve with the pears for dinner, the New York State College of Home Economics suggests: Cubed steaks and mashed potatoes, diced carrots and peas, lettuce and tomatoes, salad with French dressing, brown bread and butter, coffee for the adults, if desired and milk for the youngsters.

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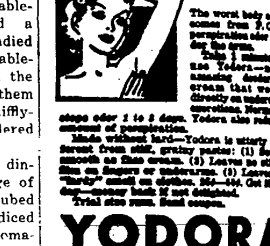
