New Gas Rates To Be Effective October 1st

Public Service Commission Approves Revision of Hornell Gas Co. Rates. On Sept. 22, the Public Service Commission will reduce rates of both gas and fuel companies. The revision of their gas rates will reduce rates of both for general service, industrial use. A reduction in the rate of the Hornell company is also made. The permitted changes effective October 1st.

The Hornell Gas Light serves gas in the city of villages of Canisteo and Wellsville and the immediate Steuben county, and the Fuel company supplies the villages of Andover, Bolivar, Cuba, Scio, Wellsville and Whitesville surrounding towns in Allegany county.
