DISH FOR THIS WEEK

A meat dish that can be quickly prepared and left in the oven to bake while the rest of the meal is being made is banana meat loaf.

Banana Meat Loaf: 2 pounds of ground beef, 4 slices bacon or salt pork, 1 cup of celery, finely diced, 2 eggs, slightly beaten, 1 1/2 cups of cracker crumbs, 3 bananas, finely diced, 1 tablespoon of lemon juice, 1/4 cup of apple sauce, Cayenne pepper, Salt and pepper.

Mix the ground beef, celery and one cup of the cracker crumbs; season them with salt and pepper and moisten with a slightly beaten egg. Pack half of the mixture into a greased loaf pan.

Then cream or dice the bananas very fine, and add to them the lemon juice, apple sauce, and one-half cup of cracker crumbs. Season with salt, pepper and cayenne, and pack this on top of the meat in the loaf pan. Over this, pack the remaining half of meat. Lay strips of bacon or salt pork across the top and bake the loaf in a moderate oven (300 to 350 degrees Fahrenheit) until it is done, or for about an hour.

For a dinner, the New York State College of Home Economics suggests banana meat loaf, creamed potatoes, buttered green beans, combination vegetable salad, hot rolls and butter, cherry tarts, milk for the children, and milk or coffee for the grown-ups.
