FIRE PREVENTION WEEK - OCT. 9 to 14

For the past 27 years, Fire Prevention Week has been widely publicized as a time to check up on homes, business places and public buildings.

Ask the average person what is the greatest cause of fire and he is apt to say "Children playing with matches."
