Believes That a Building Unit Will be Cheaper Than the Plan.

In another column of this issue it was stated that another school meeting would be held Saturday evening, Oct. 7, at the high school, between 7 and 9 p. m.

At this meeting that will be put before the district is to enlarge plans for our new school so as to accommodate the present school, thus putting the plan in one building.

The school board in its proposition before the district is to enlarge the number of the voters' commendations of the plan and also after a study of the matter from a financial standpoint, the board is convinced that the expense of remodeling the present school and other general expenses will more than offset the expense incurred in maintaining the school building.
