Andover Dairy Reimbursed Milk Dispute

Metropolitan Milk Producers Co-op Bargain Agency Andover Farmers

Syracuse, Oct. 19. (AP)—The directors of an Andover plant, who withheld milk from the market last week, have been reimbursed by the Metropolitan Milk Producers Co-operative Bargain Agency.

Bardin said the milk was withheld from the market to conform with the Federal-State milk agreement. He said the milk was sold to dairy farmers to cheese plants at a lower price.

The payment, Bardin said, was the first time in the history of the agency when farmers had been reimbursed for losses resulting from their withholding milk from the market.

One hundred and sixty of the Andover Producers association shared in the payment.

The Andover plant, which had withheld milk from the market since the strike, had failed to get its share of the market administrator's part of its sales at the time.

Shipments to the market resumed, Bardin said, and the three organizations have agreed to a "status quo" report. Future shipments will be distributed on the basis of the market administrator's part of its sales at the time.

The strike was set for Monday night when the men met and agreed to the understanding that the parts would be filed with the Federal and State producers through the metropolitan milk case upon the outcome of the milk market.

Andover dairymen praised for their strike and State officials.
