NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETING OF VOTERS Central School District No. 1 of the Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville, Independence and Ward, Allegany County, and Greenwood, Steuben County. The undersigned Board of Education of Central School District No. 1 of the Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville, Independence and Ward, Allegany County, and Greenwood, Steuben County, hereby gives notice that a Special Meeting of the voters of said District will be held at the Auditorium in the High School Building in the Village of Andover, Allegany County, New York, on the 22nd day of October, 1938, at 7:00 o'clock P. M., the polls to remain open for voting until 9:00 o'clock P. M., for the purpose of voting by ballot upon the following proposition: PROPOSITION "Shall Central School District No. 1 of the Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville, Independence and Ward, Allegany County, and Greenwood, Steuben County, authorize the Board of Education to construct a new high and grade school building at Andover, New York, instead of making additions to and alterations in the existing school building and constructing a new grade school building, in accordance with plans and specifications approved or to be approved by the Commissioner of Education of the State of New York; and to provide the necessary equipment therefor; and to purchase such land as may be necessary therefor in addition to the present site; and to expend for such proposition, in addition to the sums already voted by the said District on the 28th day of September, 1938, the sum of \$28,500.00 and to raise by tax on all taxable property in said District an amount not exceeding \$28,500.00, to be levied and collected in annual installments, as provided in Section 467 of the Education Law, in such amounts and in such years as may be determined by the said Board of Education; and to issue bonds therefor in the principal sum of \$28,500.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, in anticipation of the tax herein voted; and to raise by tax such amounts as may be necessary to pay the interest on such bonds as the same shall become due?"
