Holiday Workers Eligible To Social Security

Many workers who have not been employed in occupations covered by the Social Security Act, will be eligible to future benefits under the old-age insurance features when they become employed as extra help during the Christmas holidays, it is stated by Stanley R. Putnam, manager of the Jamestown office.

All workers taking part time positions during the coming Christmas holidays were advised to remember the following important points:

1. It is necessary to have a social security account number.
2. The social security account number should immediately be reported to the employer.
3. It is necessary to have a social security account number, if you are the only employee, and work as little as one hour a week for your employer.
4. Any employee who is in urgent need of a social security account number may secure one immediately by visiting his nearest Social Security Field Office.
