DISH FOR THIS WEEK

Holiday Left-overs

The week after Thanksgiving or a similar holiday is usually a time of cold turkey sandwiches, of chicken soups or curries of creamed turkey or chicken on toast. Another and very delicious way to use up left-overs is:

Turkey (or other fowl) Rice Custards
1/2 cup of cooked chicken or turkey, cut in small pieces.
1/2 cup of rice, cooked and seasoned.
Salt, to taste
Paprika, to taste
One cup of milk
Two eggs, beaten
Nutmeg

Mix five-chopped chicken or turkey with an equal amount of cooked seasoned, dry rice. To each cupful and a half of these combined ingredients, add salt and paprika to taste, one cupful of milk, and two beaten eggs.

Heat this mixture over hot water, then put it into buttered custard cups. Set the cups in a pan of hot water, dust grated nutmeg lightly over the tops, and bake the custards in a moderate oven until they set. Serve them hot.

To serve with the rice custards, the New York State College of Home Economics suggests this luncheon or supper menu: turkey rice custards; salad of celery, shredded lettuce and fine-chopped onion tossed together with French dressing; buttered toasted rolls and cranberry jelly; baked apple and cream sauce; coffee with unsweetened milk.
