A. H. S. Basketers Score 39-4 on Opponents' Court, Thus Remaining Undefeated

Defensive records were established as Almond, playing on her own court, failed to make a field goal in either of two games against the Andover first and second teams last Friday. Andover swept to victory by scores of 39 to 4 for first team and 17 to 1 for second team. All Almond scores came by virtue of foul shots.

On offense, George Joyce piled up a total of 23 points, playing only half the game. He was assisted by the best passwork of the season by the rest of the team. Andover's fast break was also an essential factor in the victory. Andover's offense against a set defense was not as good as expected but more practice should remedy this.

Twelve men were used in the game, giving practice to next year's "crop."
