### Panthers Down Belmont

Locals Win Third Straight

The local varsity squad added another victory to its list Friday night on the home court when Belmont became a 37-25 victim. A large audience gathered to witness the fray as a determined Belmont team lost its second game of the year.

Coach "Bill" McGee started the game with Joyce and Fulkerson in the forward positions; Briggs and Greene as guards and Saunders in center. Little scoring was done in the first quarter as neither team seemed to "click." In the second quarter Coach McGee rushed in Dugan, Oakes, Hardy and Dolan, leaving Fulkerson in. This combination dropped in five baskets the second quarter to make the score 15 to 12 at the end of the half.

In the second half the team that began the game again saw action. Joyce and Saunders tossed in a majority of 13 points scored in the third period, thereby assuming a comfortable lead. In the final quarter the team began to draw away in scoring as Andover scored nine to Belmont's six, increasing a nine-point lead to a 12 point majority as the gun sounded. All of the Andover players played about half of the game.

Saunders, Oakes and Dolan were outstanding for the Purple and White on offense, while Dugan and Dugan played good defense all night. The game was a hard fought straight set. Belmont's final score was 25 to 37.

The 21 republics, composed of Latin American countries and the United States, opened a conference in Lima, Peru on Dec. 9th, 1938 for the purpose of settling some major questions which concerned these countries.

The three main topics are: How can we enlarge our trade with the nations to the south of us? How can we stimulate increasingly friendly relations with the people in these nations? How can we prevent Germany and Italy and Japan from gaining so powerful a foothold in Latin America so as to threaten our peace and security?
