



Andover National Bank Holds Annual Meeting

Present Directors and Officers Re-elected Annual Report Shows Bank in Good Condition

The annual meeting of holders of the Andover bank was held in the directors' office Tuesday afternoon following the disposal of the routine work and the reading of the annual report of the present directors for the ensuing year:

At the directors' meeting the following officers were elected:

John E. Cannon, chairman; A. D. Baker, president; E. D. Baker, vice president; John C. Lever, cashier; R. O. Snyder, assistant.

The president's report that deposits for the year showed the largest for a year since the organization of the bank and now over \$600,000.

It was also disclosed that the capital funds of the bank were more than double that of the bank in Andover 35 years ago. Income has also increased since 1905 from about \$120,000.00 to \$240,000.00.

The report further stated that the bank has over \$400,000 in assets such as cash, bonds, etc.

The average return of investments has been over 6% in former years. A large investment in low yielding securities, however, has resulted in a net earning for the year of \$8,000.00.

A dividend was paid at the same rate as is being interest accounts and the earnings transferred funds.
