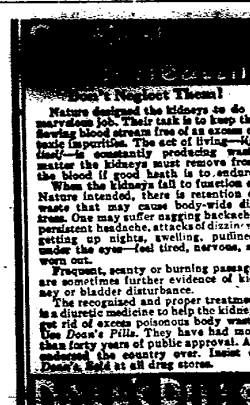
The Mitchell Sisters of Ithaca and Long Island closed a three weeks series of evangelistic meetings in the Mission Chapel here last Sunday evening.

Dog Owners' Notice

Dog licenses for 1939 expired on December 31st, 1939. The 1940 license fee was due January 1st. Licenses so issued will cover the period from January 1st to December 31st, 1940. Every dog must wear a tag of the current dog license year. A dog without such a tag is not protected by law and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction.

An unlicensed dog may be seized and killed and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that the dog is unlicensed.

Dog licenses must be obtained from the clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or kept.

License fees: Male dog, \$2.25; female dog, \$5.25; spayed female dog, \$2.25. These amounts include clerk's fees.

No license can be issued for less than the full license year.

The owner of a dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs.

The enumerators of towns and the police departments of cities are required to prepare in January of this year a list of dog owners. The omission of the name of an owner from the enumerator's or police list will not excuse the owner from obtaining a license.

If you owned a dog last year and do not own one now, so advise the clerk of your town or city.

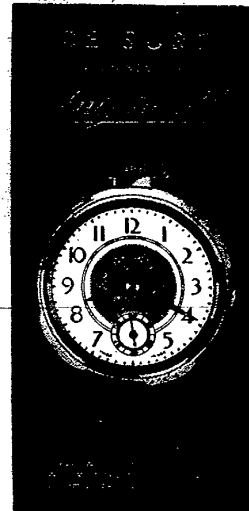
