

### Dog Owners' Notice

Dog licenses for 1939 expired or December 31st, 1939. The 1949 ii cense fee was due January 1st. Li-censes so issued will cover the period from January 1st to December 31st, 1940. Every dog must wear a tag of the current dog license year. A dog without such a tag is not pro tected by law and no action can be naintained for his injury or destruc

An unlicensed dog may be seized and killed and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that the dog is unlicensed.

No license can be issued for less

than the full license year.

The owner of a dog who fails or

refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs.

The enumerators of towns and Attorney for Executors, the police departments of cities are Andover, N. Y required to prepare in January of this year a list of dog owners. The omission of the name of an owner from the enumerator's or police list will not excuse the owner from ob taining a license.
