To make it possible to ignite safe-ty matches easily, the manufacturer puts some red phosphorus on the side of the safety match box. The red phosphorus is mixed with a little sand, glue. etc., and this mixture causes the side of the safety match box to appear dark red.

When the safety match is rubbed against the side of its box, a little red phosphorus reverts to the white form and catches on fire at once. Just as soon as the phosphorus catches on fire, it ignites the tip of the safety match.—Dr. Albert El-der, chemist.


