Study Wide Range of Food Problems

A wide range of fruit and vegetable products are under investiga-tion in the bacteriological laboratories at the State Experiment Station Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Stearns, who ree married Jan. 29, 1884, recent-te celebrated their 56th wedding anaccording to a brief summary of the 14 research projects in this field which appears in the Station's an-rual report. The projects dealing with fruit by-products are being conducted in co-operation with the Divi-sion of Chemistry and with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Emphasis is being placed particu-larly upon the development of fruit juices, especially more efficient ways of preserving them to improve the keeping quality. Among the juices receiving attention are rhubart, strawberry, raspberry, blackberry, dewberry, cherry, pear, peach, quince, grape, plum, prune and ap-ple. Apple juice has been developed to the point where it is now in com mercial production, utilizing methods developed at the Station.
