Study Wide Range of Food Problems

A wide range of fruit and vegetable products are under investigation in the bacteriological laboratories at the State Experiment Station at Geneva in an effort to develop new food products from the farm as well as to improve the processing of well-established food commodities, according to a brief summary of the 14 research projects in this field which appears in the Station's annual report. The projects dealing with fruit by-products are being conducted in co-operation with the Division of Chemistry and with the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Emphasis is being placed particularly upon the development of fruit juices, especially more efficient ways of preserving them to improve the keeping quality. Among the juices receiving attention are rhubarb, strawberry, raspberry, blackberry, dewberry, cherry, pear, peach, quince, grape, plum, prune and apple. Apple juice has been developed to the point where it is now in commercial production, utilizing methods developed at the Station.

Two Fires This Week

The firemen were called to two chimney fires this week, the first at the home of C. W. Connor of Pleasant avenue, Wednesday evening and the second at the Ernest Witter home on Rochambeau Ave. Thursday noon.
