Sulphur Shown In Sound Film

Last Thursday afternoon, Feb. 29 the chemistry class, during the class period, witnessed the showing of the film on "Sulphur." The instructor, Mr. Maloy, used this film to show the class the Frasch and Chambers processes in the production of sulphur.
The class learned many things about the production of sulphur. At the present time Texas is the chief sulphur mining state in the United States. In Texas, one will find model communities with modern equipment for those working in the sulphur fields. Huge power houses are needed to force compressed air and water at the temperature of 325 degrees F. down two of the three pipes one inside of the other, which are drilled into the ground, much as the oil workers drill for oil. The third pipe carries melted sulphur up to huge vats from the sulphur field, perhaps 1,000 feet under the level of the ground. The sulphur is slap backed under great pressure.
