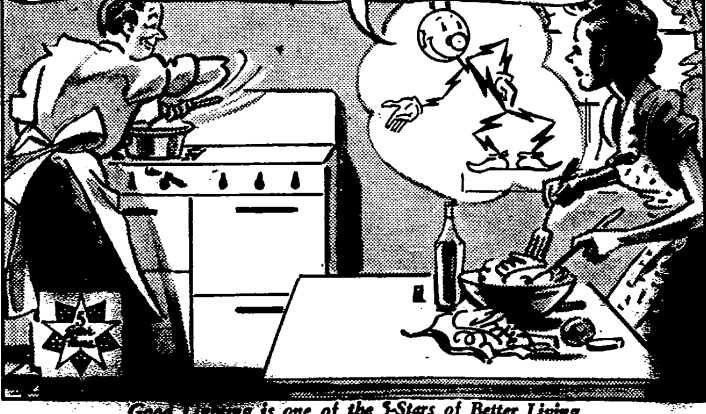

New Trout Law Effective March 18th

Season Opens in Allegany County April 20th. In Steuben County April 6th. Ten Fish Daily Limit.

A bulletin from the State Conservation Department urges all fishermen to acquaint themselves with a change recently made in the law. The two major changes in the opening date of the season and the daily "take" limit of fish for each fisherman.

The bulletin in part follows: The new law, passed by Governor Herbert H. Lehman March 18th became effective immediately. It is as follows: "Trout not less than seven inches in length may be taken and possessed in the counties of Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauque, Clinton, Erie, Essex, Fulton, Genesee, Hamilton, Livingston, Niagara, Orleans, Lawrence, Ontario, Otsego, Warren and Wyoming from the third Saturday in April to the first Saturday in August, 1940. A person may take more than ten trout in one day. No person may take from waters of Lake Glensida, in the county of Putnam, more than three rainbow trout in one day. No person shall take fish from the waters of Lake Glensida from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise."
